Michelia champaca in Natal

One of the favorite trees grown in Natal by South Africans of Indian descent is Michelia champaca. Trees of this species are to be seen in many of their gardens, and are particularly evident in the grounds of Hindu temples. No doubt, M. champaca was originally introduced to this country by Indian settlers, who brought it from their homeland, where it is much revered for its sweet scented, light orange colored blooms. To them it is known as the Champac tree.

In Pietermaritzburg, the Municipal Authorities have been using M. champaca with success as a sidewalk tree. Its tall straight growth and beautiful evergreen foliage makes it very suitable for this purpose. The tree in the photograph is about five years old.
